Re: Arkansas Tax Appeals Commission 2024 Annual Report

Dear Governor Sanders, Cabinet Secretary Bragg, and leaders of the General Assembly:

I present to you the second annual report of the Arkansas Tax Appeals Commission, as required by Arkansas Code section 26-18-1106(b)(7). This report summarizes the Commission's work in 2024. To highlight key points:

- The Commission is now fully ramped-up, issuing 21% more decisions in 2024 compared with 2023.
- More appeals are getting settled or otherwise resolved between the parties without a hearing—a 14% increase.
- Commission operations improved, with average case timelines decreasing across all appeal types.

Background

The Arkansas Tax Appeals Commission hears taxpayer appeals from actions taken by the Department of Finance and Administration, primarily proposed tax assessments. It was created by Act 586 of 2021, formed in 2022, and began hearing cases in 2023. The Commission amended its rules last year, which came into effect October 31, 2024.

Taxpayer appeals to the Commission are confidential. Our decisions are published at https://ig.arkansas.gov/tax-appeals-commission/ig-decisions-search/, with taxpayer-

identifying information redacted. Most appeals are heard by a single commissioner. Large cases are heard by the full Commission as a panel.

Analysis and Comments

As a starting point, the number of petitions received by the Commission decreased by 10% compared to 2023. In addition, more appeals were resolved between the parties without a hearing in 2024.

Commission procedures and staff have improved, as reflected in the 32% lower case load as of year-end and the improvements in the time for the Commission to reach a decision in the various categories of appeals. Having three commissioners in place throughout 2024 contributed to improved performance.

Because the appeal process for tax assessments and refund claim denials takes five or six months on average, the decision statistics for 2023 did not reflect a full rampup. 2024 is really the first full year of Commission decisions, in terms of quantity and outcomes.
